Musical Background



Iron & Wine has also covered a few songs in the process of writing originals. A couple notable ones are "Such Great Heights" by The Postal Service, "Time After Time" by Cyndi Lauper, which are both posted on Iron & Wine's Spotify page. Another one is called "Fade Into You" by Mazzy Star. This one wasn't realeased on his Spotify, but as a clip on YouTube. Beam tends to stay solo when writing and performing his songs. At live shows, there was never a specific crew, but Robert Burger, Joe Adamik, and Jim Becker were often included. His sister, Sarah, is also often doing backing vocals for a number of their songs.

Samuel Beam, otherwise known as Iron & Wine, started his music career in the early 2000s. He recorded and released his first album, *The Creek Drank the Cradle*, in September 2002. The album features 11 songs, and was recorded out of a studio Beam had set up in his house. He had released an EP six months prior to the release of his first album, *Call Your Boys*. It contained only two songs, "Call Your Boys", and "Dearest Foresaken".

One year after *The Creek Drank the Cradle*, Beam wrote another EP called *The Sea & the Rhythm*, which came out in 2003. This one included 5 songs, and had a runtime of 21 minutes and 19 seconds.

Iron & Wine's most popular song is titled "Flightless Bird, American Mouth" which has over 289,000,000 plays on Spotify alone. The song was included in the *Twilight: Breaking Dawn - Part 1* as Bella and Edward's wedding song. A couple of his other songs have been featured in other TV shows and movies throughout the years. Two songs off the album *Our Endless Numbered Days*, are both featured on fairly popular shows you can find on Netflix. "Passing Afternoon" is on season 4 episode 16 of *House, M.D.*, and "Naked as We Came" is in the first season of *Grey's Anatomy*, in episode 9.



Iron & Wine's main genre is Folk, but can also be described as Alternative or Indie. His songs are known for gentle acoustic guitar, poetic lyrics, and overall enchanting sound. The most

prominent instrument in his songs is his acoustic guitar. A couple others are bass, banjo, piano, harmonica, and various percussion.

Iron & Wine has also made several collaborations throughout the years. Ben Bridwell has been

his most common collaborator, them being childhood friends and sharing a similar musical interest. The pair released an album together in 2015, titled *Sing Into My Mouth*, which has 12 songs on it. More recently, in September of

2025, they released two EPs, one on September 9th called *I Want to Know What Love Is*, and on September 12th, *Making Good Time*. Both EPs share a song called "Luther", which was also put out as a single. Another collaborated album he did was with Calexico, and is called *In The Reins*. The album came out in 2005, and contains only 7 songs, being one of Iron & Wine's shortest official albums. Some of the songs on *In The Reins* stray from Iron & Wine's typical sound, going for more of an Americana and Latin sound.



A notable standalone collaboration was on a song called "All in Good Time" from the 2024 album *Light Verse*. "All in Good Time" features Fiona Apple, an Alternative/Indie songwriter. Their song tells a story of separation, learning, and growing in a relationship. Some consider it to be about the cycle of good times following bad times, and vice versa. The song got over 6.5 million Spotify listens.

Iron & Wine has just over 3.5 million monthly listeners. Around the world, Mexico City averages the most listens per month out of everyone. On average, they have around 55,000 monthly listeners. That's closely followed by London, England with 50,000, then Sydney, Australia with 47,000. There isn't a current statistic for Victoria, but in Vancouver, B.C. it averages around 12,000 per month.

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
Our Endless Numbered Days is Iron & Wine's second official album, but the first to be recorded in a studio. Sam works with producer Brian Deck, in a studio called Engine studios, which is located in Chicago, Illinois. The album has 12 songs, and a runtime of 44 minutes and 47 seconds. The album also has a deluxe edition, which was released on the same day as the original album, March 23, 2002.



Personal Experience

I first heard Iron & Wine around two years ago and was immediately interested. The first song I was interested in was "Naked as We Came". I heard a 15 second clip of it from something a friend of mine had posted, and as soon as I heard it I went to go check it out on Spotify. The song had been pretty consistently playing for me in the weeks after I discovered it, along with the song "Cinder and Smoke". From there, I'd listen to other songs on occasion, but those had remained my top two for months. A little while later I had come across another song, and I got super into a ton of them. Iron & Wine was my 2nd top artist of 2025, with a lot of songs constantly appearing in my Spotify-made On Repeat playlist.

The deluxe edition has 8 more songs than the main album, and a runtime of 1 hour and 14 minutes. The added songs on the deluxe are all demos coming from the album. It showcases the first idea of the song, giving how it was originally written to sound. There's little to no lyric changes, but there are clear changes in tempo, and instruments.



Track No. 1 - On Your Wings

On Your Wings is the opening track on Our Endless Numbered Days. It has been interpreted to be about immaturity, hope, and longing for change and a chance to get away from everything. It opens with a twangy guitar sound, joined by Sam's vocals. The song is 3 minutes and 53 seconds long, and is a great opener to understand the vibe and sound of the album right from the start.



I'd rate the song a 6/10. I like it for its opening sound, and I think it's a good song to start the album. It's personally not one of my go-to's, but I'd never skip it when listening to the first album. When I first heard it, it took a bit of time for it to really grow on me, but know I'm happy to say it has.

Track No. 2 - Naked as We Came

This specific song will always be special to me. I'll rate it a 9/10 Every time I hear it, I'm reminded of the friend who posted it. Track No. 3 - Cinder and Smoke

Track No. 9 - Free Until They Cut Me Down


